-THE REAL ESTATE CORNER



Pratt Thomas with Merrill P. Thomas Co. Inc. recently reported that RailPort Logistics, located near Rabbit Creek in Theodore, will create over 1,000 new, high-paying jobs and \$600 million in capital expenditure associated with the industrial warehouse development moving into 2025 and beyond. This effort anticipates a completed build out of 5 million square feet over the next five to 10 years. The project is one of only a few of Class A industrial sites nationally served by a CSX rail line. The site broke ground last October with the goal of creating modern distribution warehousing operations that support logistics and light manufacturing operations in the area.

Starting in 2025, Bayou La Batre shipyard Birdon is expected to create 136 new jobs over the next three years, boosting their workforce to over 200 employees. The growth plan follows on the heels of Birdon's acquisition of their Bayou La Batre location nearly a year ago in March 1, 2024, and reflects the company's efforts to support the U.S. Coast Guard with next generation Inland Buoy Tenders vessels known as Waterways Commerce Cutters (WCC). The contractor was awarded

a \$1.187-billion contract in 2022 to design and build 27 WCCs over a 10-year period.

In an update, work on the new Mobile International Airport, a \$414-million project, is anticipated to be completed by no later than December of this year and placed into service in early 2026. All commercial air service is also expected to transition over from the Mobile Regional Airport in West Mobile afterwards.

Last month out-of-state investors paid \$745,000 for some 3.8 acres of property located at 88 Telegraph Road in Mobile. The buyers plan to renovate the property for industrial outdoor storage and make available for lease. Pete Riehm represented the buyers and Tommy Gleason worked for the seller. Both agents work for CRE Mobile.

In January Mobile County paid \$1.25 million for 48 acres found at 3461 Halls Mill Road in West Mobile. Crawford Stitt with White-Spunner Realty represented the seller in the transaction. The property is adjacent to the Mobile County Sportsplex and will be developed as part of that site. Matt White of Coastal Alabama Real Estate worked for the buyer in the deal.

An acai bowl restaurant, leased 1,200 square-foot space located in Piccadilly Square at 6543 Airport Boulevard in West Mobile and plans to open soon, according to Leigh Dale Younce and Chris Harle of White-Spunner Realty, who represented the landlord in the transaction.



- HISTORY OF THE MOON PIE

Whether eating the largest MoonPie at a Celebration, catching a MoonPie by a Masker, or even dropped from a building at midnight, no town does MoonPies like Mobile.

"You know all about the beads, parades, masks and mayhem of Mardi Gras in New Orleans. But did you know that the country's first Mardi Gras celebration was held not in the Crescent City, but 125 miles east, in Mobile, Alabama? It's true, and there's more: snack-lovers who get there in time for the parades can seriously rack up on free MoonPies.

Here's the backstory: In 1703, Mobile was the capital of French Louisiana. French Catholic settlers brought with them their 'carnival' traditions of feasting, revelry and merriment on the days preceding Ash Wednesday, which was followed by fasting during the somber, sacrificial season of Lent. Fifteen years later, Louisiana's capital moved to the newly founded New Orleans, as did the Mardi Gras tradition.

But it's well-documented that Mobile's first parade was held in 1711, when 16 men pushed a cart carrying a large papier-mâché cow's head down the street, kicking off a big outdoors party.

The founding of New Orleans didn't stop the party.

Mobile's parades evolved into elaborate, multi-weekend affairs,
mostly happening between Saturday and the Shrove
Tuesday sendoff before Ash Wednesday.

Similar to New Orleans, Mobile krewes are known for hurling a particular Southern delicacy: the chocolate-dipped marshmallow and graham cracker sandwich named after our planet's only permanent natural satellite.

According to Judi Gulledge, who is the executive director of the Mobile Carnival Association and also runs the Carnival Museum, the MoonPie tradition began in the 1940s and 1950s, when float organizers wanted to toss something softer into the crowds than Cracker Jack boxes.

'The MoonPie became a staple throw in Mobile in the early 60s,' said Gulledge. 'Members from a local ladies' organization were in Chattanooga at a convention meeting and ran across some MoonPies, and thought they would make a great throw. The reasoning? They are soft and have some weight to them, so when the ladies' tossed them, they had some leverage. They were looking for something economical, and MoonPies checked all of the boxes. They brought them back to Mobile and it caught on as a novelty.'

Now, an estimated 500,000 MoonPies from Chattanooga Bakery are thrown each year.

'While MoonPies are definitely unique to Mobile, most of our other food traditions, like King Cake, beignets and seafood, we share with New Orleans,' explained Mobile native and local caterer Clifton Morrissette."


